

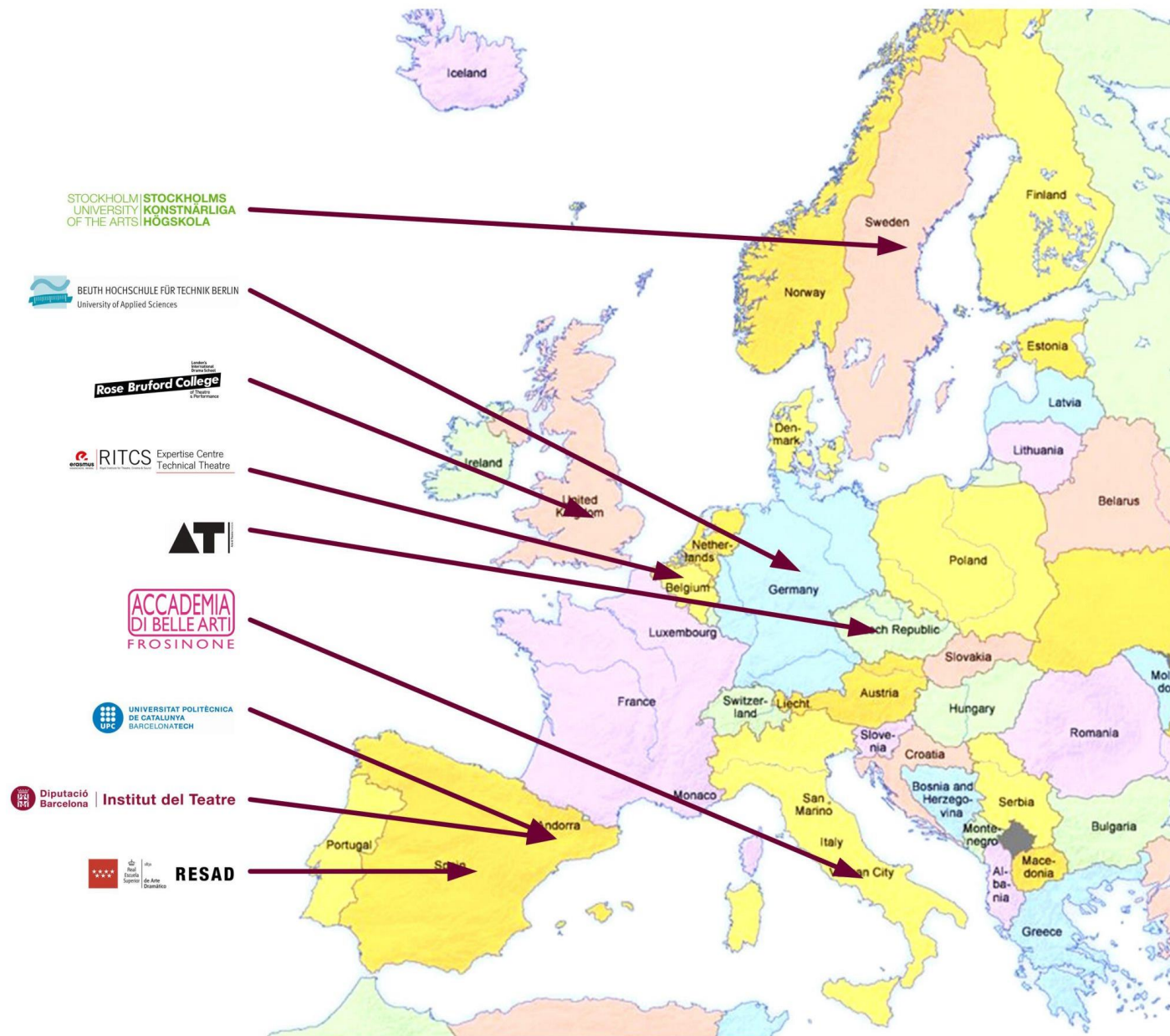

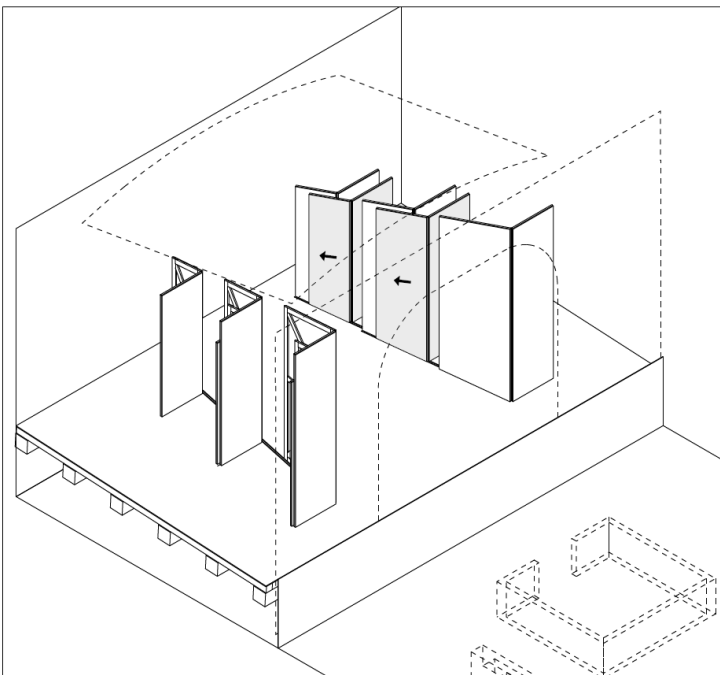

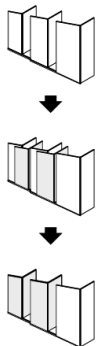

B2CH06-A [WITHOUT SUPERIOR GUIDES]

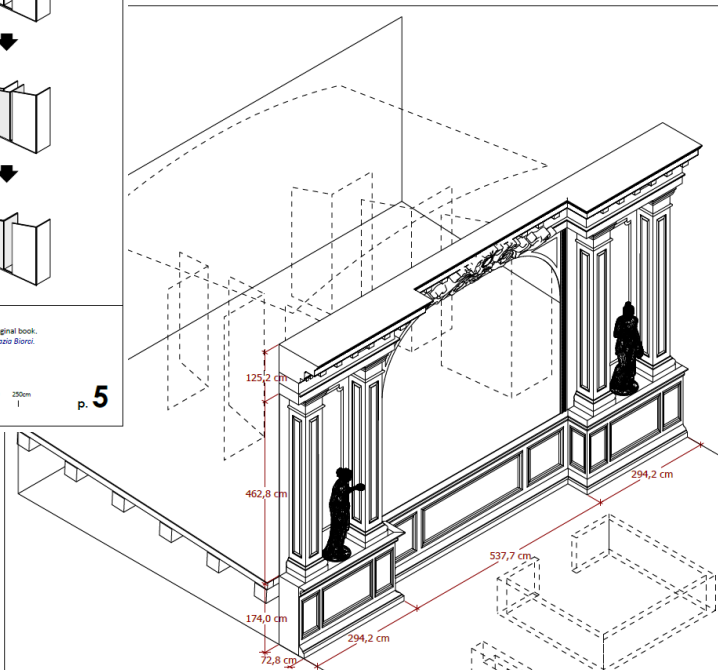
- Houses 8.7cm apart to allow the secondary houses to slide between them.
- Secondary houses built with the same measurements as the houses they have to cover.
- Guide placed on the pavement. Width 5.8 cm and length as much as the sum between the house to be covered and the preceding one.

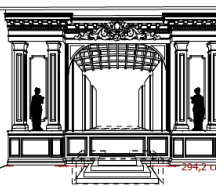

B2CH03

- To avoid having to leave the front part of the first houses fixed and to allow a total change of scene, a proscenium with columns, statues and an arch at the mouth of the scene can be built.

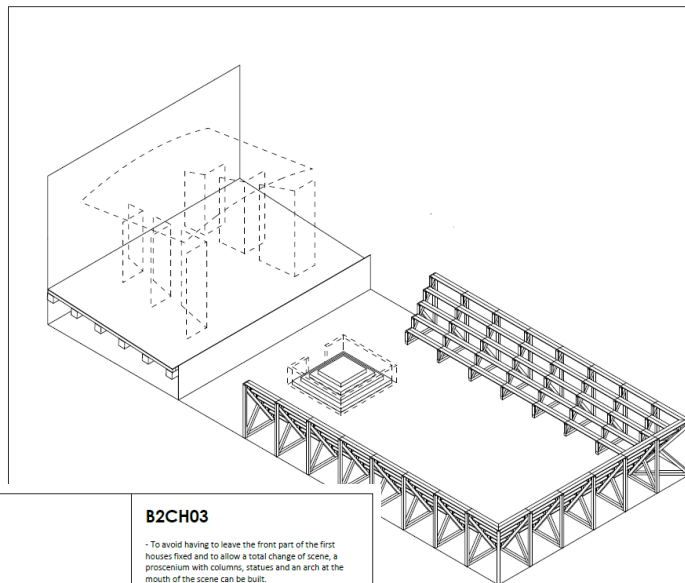
- An image taken from the *Pavimento Fund* on the *Teatro della Pergola* in Florence from 1658 has been taken as a reference.

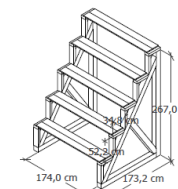

B1CH35

- Square made of wooden slats with a square section (12x12cm) with a diagonal in the center to avoid buckling. The joints between the different slats will be made with wooden blocks so that they are well attached. The squares will be placed in the room every 174cm along its walls.
- Small square made up of wooden slats with a rectangular section (12x6cm) 52.2cm high and 34.8cm wide. Union made by nails.
- 2cm thick wooden plank that is placed on top of the small squares to serve as a seat.
- This method allows to make seats for the public without perforating the floor of the room or its walls.

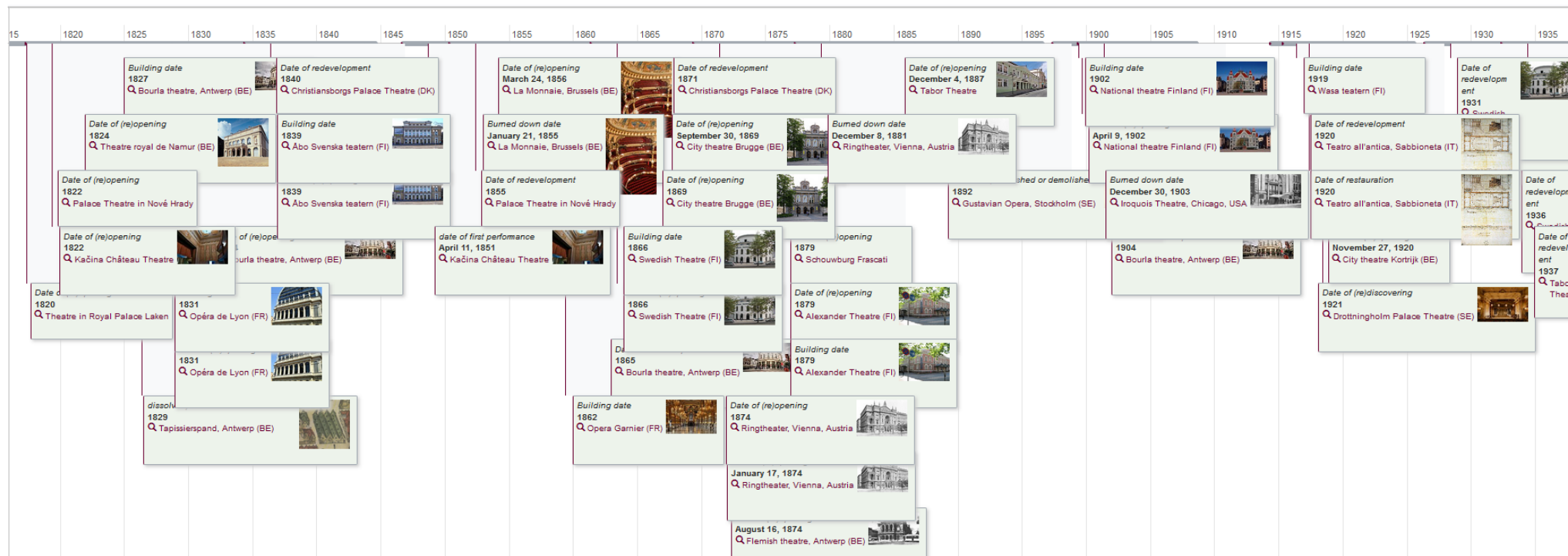
